What is IPBES?



The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES)

IPBES's objective:

To <u>strengthen the science-policy interface for biodiversity and ecosystem services</u> for the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity, long-term human well-being and sustainable development.

- An independent intergovernmental body, established in 2012 by Governments, with currently 130 Members
- IPBES is currently implementing its first work programme (2014-2018)
- Collaborative partnership arrangement with UNEP, UNESCO, FAO and UNDP
- Secretariat hosted by Germany, in Bonn



What does IPBES do?

The work of IPBES is grouped around four complementary functions:

- Assessing knowledge (synthesis & critical evaluation of available knowledge)
 - On specific themes: "Pollinators, Pollination and Food Production" (2016); "Land Degradation and Restoration" (2018), ...
 - On methodological issues: "Scenarios and Models" (2016), "Values" (ongoing)
 - At both the regional and global levels: 4 Regional assessments of Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (2018); "Global Assessment of Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (2019)

Policy support

- Identifying policy-relevant tools and methodologies
- Facilitating their use & catalysing their future development

Building capacity

- Identifying & meeting priority capacity needs of IPBES Members, experts & stakeholders.
- Catalysing the generation of new knowledge
 - Identifying and communicating gaps in knowledge to help fill gaps

The overall policy context

- The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable development (Sustainable Development Goals)
- The Strategic Plan for Biodiversity 2011-2020, and the post 2020 Strategic Plan
- The Paris Agreement on Climate Change



How is IPBES Structured?

Plenary: Decision-making body

Responsible for the overall work programme, working through Bureau and MEP





Bureau

Responsible for overseeing the administrative functions of IPBES



Multidisciplinary Expert Panel (MEP)

Responsible for carrying out the **scientific** and **technical** functions of the work programme,







Expert groups for assessments, policy support tools and other studies



Task forces on capacity-building, knowledge and data, and indigenous and local knowledge










IPBES assessment on Pollinators, Pollination & Food Production

- Released in 2016
- Uptake:
 - International level

 - CBD: Decision XIII/15 (Dec. 2016) on the implications of the IPBES assessment on pollination for the work of the Convention
 - FAO: International Initiative on Pollination
 - UNDP: "Trialogues on pollination" (UNDP/BES-Net)
 - National level
 - An expanding list of national strategies and action plans on pollination: Argentina, Canada, Colombia, England, India, Scotland, Wales, Ireland, France, the Netherlands, Norway, Brazil, South Africa, Republic of Korea, USA.
 - Coalition of the willing to protect pollinators and to promote pollination (https://promotepollinators.org/)



IPBES assessment of scenarios and models of biodiversity and ecosystem services


- Released in 2016
- Uptake:
 - Decision CBD/COP/13/XIII/29 on the Global Biodiversity Outlook 5
 - SBSTTA 21 (December 2017)
 - BiodivERsA/Belmont Forum joint research call for proposals on scenarios and models of biodiversity and ecosystem services: 25 million Euros


IPBES assessment of land degradation and restoration




IPBES regional assessments of biodiversity and ecosystem services

- Released in 2018
- Uptake (in progress):
 - Working with CBD on uptake at next COP
 - CBD SBSTTA22 (Montreal, July 2018): Full day workshop; IPBES reports considered by SBSTTA-22
 - Presentation of the key findings of the Asia-Pacific Regional Assessment at a high-level roundtable on SDG15 during the Asia-Pacific Forum on Sustainable Development (Bangkok, March 2018).
 - Promoting and supporting uptake events at various levels
 - EU, Belgium, Switzerland, Finland ...
 - Africa, Latin America, Asia Pacific ...


















IPBES work on policy support

- 2 methodological assessments and their follow-up
 - · Scenarios & models, values
 - Phase 2 (scenarios & models)
 - ...
- Development of policy support web portal
 - Catalogue of policy support tools and methodologies
 - Facilitating access to policy instruments and policy support tools to be used by policy makers and practitioners in their specific context

IPBES work on on mobilisation and generation of knowledge

- Working with indigenous and local knowledge
 - Development and approval of ILK approach
 - Catalysing supportive activities mobilizing ILK
 - ...
- Identification of knowledge gaps and needs arising from assessments
 - Development of an approach including e-conference
 - Promoting the uptake of identified needs in future research (example: BiodivERsA / Belmont Forum)



IPBES Social Media Results May 2017 – May 2018

- Approximate number of social media 'mentions': 60,000
- Facebook: Followers +383%; Reach +2897%; **Engagement +649%**
- Twitter: Followers +83%; Reach +178%; Engagement +100%
- YouTube: Followers +235%; Reach +311%; Engagement +477%
- Instagram: Followers +811%; Reach 19,000 impressions; Engagement +1675%

'TRACK': New IPBES Impact Tracking Database

- Secretariat cannot track alone: Need the assistance of all stakeholders.
- Developed new tool: 'TRACK' to:
 - (a) Document indicative evidence of IPBES impact.
 - (b) Share via public searchable database on IPBES website.
 - (c) Use to support IPBES communications and outreach.
- NB: TRACK is not designed to be comprehensive, analytically rigorous or offer wider monitoring functions – indicative list, externally populated, unverified.

Remaining deliverables from IPBES First Work Programme:

- Global assessment to be adopted at IPBES 7 (May 2019)
- Methodological assessment on values just started, to be adopted at IPBES 9 (2021?)
- Assessment on sustainable use of wild species

 just started, to be adopted at IPBES 9 (2021?)
- Assessment on invasive alien species—will start next year, to be adopted at IPBES
 9 (2021?), there will be a call for nominations of experts coming very soon

IPBES Next Work Programme:

- To be adopted at IPBES 7 (May 2019)
- MEP & Bureau currently working on a draft of the next work programme
 - Including strategic framework for 10 years until 2030; requests from governments and stakeholders for deliverables
 - Draft to be shared for comments and reviews from governments and stakeholders in November / December





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
