The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES)

An independent intergovernmental body – currently 137 State Members Set up in 2012 (IPCC in 1988)

Mission: to strengthen knowledge foundations for better policy through science



Decision IPBES-7/1 Rolling work programme of the Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services up to 2030

The Plenary,

Recalling its decisions IPBES-5/3 and IPBES-6/2,

Acknowledging with appreciation the efforts of the Bureau and the Multidisciplinary Expert Panel and the contributions by members and stakeholders of the Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services in the development of the rolling work programme of the Platform up to 2030,

Welcoming the requests, inputs and suggestions on short-term priorities and longer-term strategic needs, including those submitted by the relevant bodies of multilateral environmental agreements related to biodiversity and ecosystem services,

Taking note of the report by the Multidisciplinary Expert Panel and the Bureau¹ containing a prioritized list of requests, inputs and suggestions prepared in line with decision IPBES-6/2 and the procedure for receiving and prioritizing requests put to the Platform set out in decision IPBES-1/3,

- Adopts the rolling work programme of the Platform for the period up to 2030 set out in annex I to the present decision;
- Decides to launch a call for further requests, inputs and suggestions regarding the work
 programme, in time for consideration by the Plenary at its tenth session, and to consider at the same
 session the need for and timing of further calls;

Implementation of the rolling work programme of the Platform up to 2030

- 1. Decides to proceed with the implementation of the rolling work programme up to 2030 in accordance with the approved budget set out in decision IPBES-7/4 and within available resources;
- Requests the Executive Secretary to provide a report on progress in the implementation
 of the work programme, in line with the present decision, to the Plenary at its eighth session;

Assessing knowledge

 Approves the summary for policymakers of the global assessment of biodiversity and ecosystem services,² and accepts the chapters of the assessment, including their executive summaries;³

IPBES work programme (4 main complementary areas)



Assessments (synthesis & critical evaluation of available knowledge)

- On specific themes (e.g. "Pollinators & Food Production", "Land Degradation" ...)
- On methodological issues (e.g. "Scenarios and Models" & "Values")
- identification of knowledge gaps & catalyse efforts to generate new knowledge

Policy Support



- Identifying policy-relevant tools and methodologies
- Facilitating their use & catalysing their future development

Building Capacity & Knowledge



 Identifying & meeting priority capacity, knowledge & data needs, integration of Indigenous and Local Knowledge (ILK)

Communications, Outreach & Stakeholder Engagement



- Ensuring the widest reach and impact of IPBES work
- Supporting participatory, inclusive and transparent IPBES processes.






The IPBES conceptual framework



The IPBES Global assessment of biodiversity and ecosystem services, May 2019

A major undertaking:

- 3 years
- 500 scientists
- 6 chapters (1,800 pages)
- 1 summary for policymakers
- 15,000 publications
- 20,000 comments received: indepth peer review

Part of an important sequence toward 2020:

- G7 Environment (4-6 May, Metz, France)
- Scientific basis for the post 2020 biodiversity framework (COP 15, Nov. 2020)

An unprecedented global interest in biodiversity:

- 24,000 press articles
- 150 countries, 45 languages

Who are IPBES Stakeholders?

Decision IPBES/3/18, annex II

IPBES stakeholders = both contributors to and end-users of IPBES outputs

Contributors: e.g. knowledge-holders, scientists & practitioners

End-users: e.g. policy-makers, businesses & communities

Stakeholders can:

Contribute to the activities of the work programme through experience, expertise, knowledge & data etc.

Use or benefit from outputs of the work programme;


Encourage and support the participation of scientists and knowledge-holders in the work of the Platform.


Accredited observers (organizations) to Plenary sessions: able to influence IPBES processes.

Why Stakeholder participation is important for IPBES?

"...The happening of something does not show all.

It doesn't show where does that happening makes sense.

Knowledge alone is not enough. We need to know the context in which such knowledge makes sense, and to which it belongs. Otherwise, we don't know how to apply it.



ONet main objectives




- Foster a two-way communication between network members and IPBES;
